## Student Pair Share Meaning of Words Activity

1, Assign each group 5 words. Give them a group of index cards where the pair writes there meaning on the back of the card after reading the context clue.

- 3. When the group finishes, provide cards with the meaning of words and have them pick out the meaning.
- 4. Have a representative of the group fill in the definition on the board or smartboard.
- 5. Correct and question entire class meaning if wrong.

Students need to assess if their meaning and the word's meaning matched.
